LESSON: Keepsake Assignment: Short and Sweet Exercise

TIME: Estimated 1 class period to complete project (50-minute period)

CLASS LEVEL: 7th and 8th grade Language Arts

TEKS LANGUAGE ARTS GOAL: In this lesson, students read a short story, discuss the writer's use of irony, and compose a short expository response.

ESSENTIAL QUESTION: How do the ordinary objects we collect in our daily lives reflect who we are as people?

STUDENTS:

*Read "The Gift of the Magi" by O. Henry.

*Discuss the plot development, characters, and irony of O. Henry's story.

*Brainstorm about a personal keepsake that has important meaning.

*Compose a short expository response about their special keepsake.

TEKS:

7th and 8th grade Language Arts: Reading/Fluency, Reading/Vocabulary Development, and Writing/Expository Texts

Vocabulary:

Irony: when a situation turns out differently from what one would normally expect

Artifact: an object produced or shaped by human workmanship

Keepsake: something given or kept as a reminder; memento

Step 1

Students read aloud "The Gift of the Magi" by O. Henry. Discuss with students the writer's use of irony in the story.

Step 2

Discuss with students the characters' motivations for choosing the specific objects they wish to give to each other. Discuss how these simple objects have special meaning in the characters' lives.

Step 3

Have students brainstorm about the ordinary objects from their own lives that they consider a valuable keepsake. Have students choose one special keepsake to write about.

Step 4

Have students write a one-page expository response explaining their keepsake. Use questions like the following to prompt their response:

- *Describe your object.
- *Explain the object's history.
- *Tell how you obtained the object.
- *Explain any special memories or stories that you associate with the object.
- *Explain how this object has special meaning for you.

EXTENSION:
